a resident of Fellowship Square's Largo Landing Fellowship House, a community in Upper Marlboro that provides housing for older adults living on extremely limited fixed incomes. Fellowship Square is one of the leading local providers of affordable housing and services to low-income seniors. Through HUD funding and vouchers, residents of Fellowship Houses-many who live on Social Security or Supplemental Security Income alone, with an average annual fixed-income of 10,000/year – pay no more than 30 percent of their income toward their housing costs, including rent and a utility allowance.

Ms. Spencer has resided at Largo Landing for the past 23 years, when, after her four children had grown up and established their families and careers, she recalls that she said to herself, "Gladys, now that you see what they are doing with their lives and getting their things done and getting themselves settled, it's about time to look out for yourself for a while." She's been an active member of the Largo Landing Fellowship House community ever since. Gladys likes to participate in bingo, casino, and the many other social events offered to residents. She also enjoys going on outings with her grown children, loves poetry, and has even published a poem. Her advice to the younger generation is to "always do the right thing, be wise enough to do so, and show respect and patience

U.S. Department of Education Awards Bowie State \$5 Million Grant to Diversify Pipeline of School Counselors

Congressman Steny Hoyer Discusses Mental Health Counseling in Schools with BSU Students

BOWIE, Md. (April 5, 2023)—Congressman Steny Hoyer hosted a round table discussion with students and faculty members at Bowie State today to discuss mental health issues plaguing public schools, and the five-year \$5 million grant recently awarded to the university by the Department of Education (DoE) to combat the crisis.

The grant is funded through the DoE's Mental Health Service Professionals Demonstration program which aims to train more school counselors, psychologists, and other mental health practitioners to serve in lowincome elementary, middle and high schools across the country.

"Our public schools are in the midst of a mental health emergency," said Congressman Hoyer. "This grant will enable Bowie State to partner with local school districts to help increase the number of highly qualified school counselors who can provide mental health services in highneed schools while increasing the number of underrepresented counselors."

Bowie State's Department of Counseling will partner with the Anne Arundel County, Montgomery County and Prince George's County Public School Districts to

train BSU graduate students in the counseling program and current school counselors to increase the number of state-certified counselors to work with diverse students.

"Fourteen of our graduate students will be placed at 14 high-need schools that have been identified by our partners," said Dr. Nikki Ham, assistant professor of counseling and president of the Maryland School Counselor Association. "Our goal is to create a pipeline of culturally sensitive mental health professionals to serve emotionally distressed students who suffer from depression, anxiety, trauma-related disorders and other mental health conditions.'

Approximately 7,000 students are expected to be served by the grant project each year.

Governor Moore Announces New Partnership Between Maryland Department of Environment and University of Maryland Center for Global Sustainability to Model Maryland's Climate Goals Pathway

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (April 3, 2023)—Governor Wes Moore today announced a new partnership between the Maryland Department of the Environment and The Center for Global Sustainability at the University of Maryland to model Maryland's pathway toward ambitious climate goals. The announcement came during a roundtable discussion at the State House with climate goal stakeholders including representatives from the Maryland Department of the Environment, University of Maryland, League of Conservation Voters, Maryland Commission on Environmental Justice and Sustainable Communities, and Blink Charging.

"We face an historic challenge-and we will tackle it with an all-of-government, an all-of-community, and an all-of-state approach," said Governor Moore. "We cannot win this fight alone. It will take partnership, it will take collaboration, it will take teamwork; that includes this partnership with the University of Maryland and all of the stakeholders today."

Maryland's Climate Solutions Now Act of 2022 calls for 60% in emissions reductions by 2031 the most ambitious target in the country. The act requires the state to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by setting more aggressive state goals; requires electric companies to increase gross energy savings; develops energy efficiency and emissions

reduction requirements for certain buildings; establishes zero-emission vehicle requirements in the state fleet; and establishes an electric school bus pilot program.

The act also set Maryland's first-ever net-zero emissions goal. By 2045, annual statewide greenhouse gas emissions must be balanced with removals of greenhouse gasses from the atmosphere, such as from carbon sequestration in trees and

"These ambitious plans must not only include solutions to achieve our goals but must also lay a foundation for just and equitable implementation," said Maryland Department of the Environment Secretary Serena McIlwain. "Marylanders' voices are critical in helping the plan deliver emissions reductions and realize economic benefits across the state."

The analysis and framework will outline the emissions reductions potential from multiple sectors and cover all harmful greenhouse gas emissions—including methane and hydrofluorocarbons. Critically, the framework will set the stage for actors at all levels to engage in thoughtful climate leadership to improve Maryland's air and environment and help transition the most vulnerable communities to clean energy.

"Our experts will work directly with our state partners and other stakeholders to understand the current climate trajectory based on state and local policies, federal action, and market forces," said

Director of the Center for Global Sustainability Nate Hultman. "Our analysis will identify new and feasible state policies to help reduce the necessary emissions while improving economic, public, and environmental health for all."

The Maryland Department of the Environment

is currently seeking public input on climate change strategies for Maryland. The report and framework will then be open for public comment this summer. Following the open comment period, a final policy framework and plan will be delivered at the end of 2023.

"I remember my father calling my mother to come outside to see the pilots ejecting from the plane. I remember my mother's screams as we ran into a neighbor's yard. The plane crashed into a house. Mrs. Morgan turned my head so I wouldn't see it, but it was too late, I'll never forget that black smoke. I also remember my dad and other men running into the house to save people. My dad said, 'The man on the couch was pinned in by a wing of the plane and he told us to get out before the whole house exploded.' "Donna (Glagola) Gentile, who sent this report, lived on Suitland Road back in 1951 when that plane from Andrews crashed into a Morningside house about a block from her home.

That man on the couch may have been Irvin Guyer who died in the fire.

About ten years ago, I had a call from New Jersey, from a woman who said she was Irvin Guyer's daughter (or granddaughter). She talked about the tragedy and how it changed her life.

It's a story that doesn't go away.

Prince George's County Leads the State in Recycling and Waste Diversion

Ranks No. 1 in recycling and diverting trash from the Landfill

LARGO, Md. (April 4, 2023)—Prince George's County is once again the leader in Maryland for keeping trash from the landfill and recycling right. The County recently adopted new initiatives to reduce waste to help the County reclaim the top spot. One such initiative includes expanding its curbside composting program, PGC Composts, to 85,000 households, with plans for all residents receiving County trash and recycling services to receive a green-wheeled cart by the end of the year.

"We are Prince George's Proud to reclaim the #1 recycling and waste diversion spot in the State, showing that Prince George's County is developing innovative practices that lead by example in Maryland and even the nation," said County Executive Angela Alsobrooks. "We continue to adopt smart waste technologies that increase efficiency, lower collection costs, and divert more trash away from our landfill. With the support of our residents, we will continue to build an even more environmentally friendly and sustainable County."

"We are excited to show that Prince Georgians continue to create sustainable habits in their daily lives to protect and preserve our environment," said Andrea Crooms, Director of the Prince George's County Department of the Environment (DoE). "With improvements to several of our waste collection services, we not only divert valuable resources from being trashed but reduce our greenhouse gases, improve our soil health, and conserve our water."

According to the latest figures released by the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) for 2021, the County's waste diversion stands at 65.71 percent and recycling at 61.71 percent, surpassing those from the calendar year 2020 of 46.34 and 41.34, respectively.

The recycling tonnage is divided by the total waste number (tonnage) to obtain the recycling rate. MDE calculates the rate by adding the disposed trash tonnage and the recycling tonnage to provide a total waste number. The County also received a Source Reduction Credit from MDE for engaging and educating residents on reducing waste at its source. Examples of source reduction practices include leaving grass trimmings on your lawn to add nutrients back into the soil, using reusable shopping bags and water bottles, and selecting products that contain the least amount of packaging.

The County has instituted several regulations to assist in diverting waste from the landfill, including requiring all businesses to provide recycling and trash receptacles in and outside their business. This regulation also extends to multi-family residences/apartments. In addition, the County has a Styrofoam and plastic straw ban, and beginning June 1, whether you go into a restaurant for takeout, go through the drive-through, or order from an app, food service ware will be provided upon request only. This includes foodware accessories like ketchup, straws, napkins, and cutlery. Another waste-reducing strategy involves installing solar-powered, sensor-equipped trash and recycling compactors in high-traffic areas.

County Council Presents Emergency Legislation Addressing Landlord Retaliation for Rent Stabilization

Proposed Measure Protects Tenants from Unlawful and Retaliatory Rent Increases and Eviction as Rent Stabilization Act of 2023 Takes Effect

The Prince George's County Council, during session on Tuesday, April 4, 2023, presented Emergency Legislation concerning Landlord Retaliation for Rent Stabilization. CB-051-2023 declares certain actions by landlords as retaliation, including the termination of a lease to force a pre-existing tenant into a new lease, to avoid rent increase limitations established by the Rent Stabilization Act of 2023, which takes effect on April 17, 2023.

CB-051-2023 prevents landlords from increasing rents over 3% for existing tenants (those with a valid lease prior to April 17th), including landlords of senior housing properties subject to the Rent Stabilization Act of 2023. The measure also prohibits the harassment, intimidation, and/or threat of tenants' exercise of their legal rights.

Council Member Krystal Oriadha, author of CB-051-2023 and the Rent Stabilization Act of 2023, says The People's Council is committed to protecting renters from the actions of unprincipled landlords.

"Since the Rent Stabilization Act of 2023 passed, our office, and several other Council offices have been inundated with calls from renters whose landlords are using various methods to increase rents by hundreds of dollars. From residents living in senior facilities, to families who are being asked to sign renewal contracts months ahead, these actions are predatory and validate our concerns that a permanent solution is needed to stop bad actors from taking advantage of Prince Georgians. We hope this bill will help us close some of the loopholes while we continue to work towards a permanent solution."

On February 28, the County Council voted to support CB-007-2023, legislation establishing the Rent Stabilization Act of 2023. The measure, which becomes law on April 17, 2023, temporarily amends the Landlord-Tenant Code to limit landlords' ability to increase rent for tenants above 3% over a 12-month period. Under the legislation, a landlord cannot increase rent above 3% for any tenant and cannot issue a notice of rent increase over 3% during the twelve months of the Rent Stabilization Act.

Local History Remembered:

Prince George's County Lynching Memorial Project (PGC LMP) to Honor County's Earliest Known **Lynching Victim**

FORT WASHINGTON, Md. (April 2, 2023)—The Prince George's County Lynching Memorial Project (PGC LMP), a local grassroots organization, will hold a community remembrance to honor Mr. Thomas Juricks, whose 1869 lynching is the first documented in Prince George's County. The community remembrance is co-sponsored by the M-NCPPC Black History Program.

The community remembrance will be held Saturday, April 15,

2023, from 1–3 p.m. at the Harmony Hall Arts Center in the Harmony Hall Regional Center, 10701 Livingston Road, Fort Washington, MD, 20744. The event is free and open to the public but space is limited. Registration is encouraged but not required: https://bit.ly/TJuricks2023.

This moving program will tell the story of Mr. Thomas Juricks, a Black laborer and farmhand who lived with his family in the Piscataway area near Fort Washington and was extrajudicially murdered by a White masked mob on October 12, 1869. The historical aspects of his life and tragic lynching will be paired with a long overdue send-off for Mr. Juricks that will acknowledge and honor him through a libation

ceremony, soil collection, music, poetry and dance. Opportunities will be provided to the entire community to reflect and acknowledge that his life mattered and understand how this violent history reverberates into present-day issues such as white supremacy, mass incarceration and educational disparities between races.

The PGC LMP is a registered non-profit, all-volunteer organization affiliated with Bryan Stevenson's Equal Justice Initiative and the Maryland Lynching Memorial Project. Its mission is to educate the public on the truths of our nation's continuing legacy of the institution of slavery and its impact on enslaved persons and their descendants, memorialize victims of racial terror lynchings in our county, and advance the cause of racial justice and reconciliation through mutual support and collaboration.

A Ripe Time

This special holy season this year, as many people are observing Ramadan, Passover, and Easter during the same week, is also fifty-five years to the week after Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s assassination. It is as useful as ever right now to return to his last Sunday sermon, delivered at the National Cathedral in Washington, D.C., on March 31, 1968. Dr. King said its title, "Remaining Awake Through a Great Revolution," was based on the old story of Rip Van Winkle, who fell asleep for twenty years and slept right through the American Revolution—and he warned us that during upheaval in our own times we must not do the same.

As Dr. King spoke about the freedom revolution

he saw happening around the world and the urgent need for America to finally end racial injustice, he addressed "the myth of time." This was the idea that only the passage of time would ultimately solve this, and Black people and their allies simply needed to be patient. Dr. King said there is an answer to this myth: "It is that time is neutral. It can be used whether constructively or destructively. And I am sorry to say this morning that I am absolutely convinced that the forces of ill will in our nation, the extreme rightists of our nation—the people on the wrong side—have used time much more effectively than the forces of

He continued: "It may well be that we will have to repent in this generation, not merely for the vitriolic words and the violent actions of the bad people, but for the appalling silence and indifference of the good people who sit around and say, 'Wait on time.' Some-

where we must come to see that human progress never rolls in on the wheels of inevitability. It comes through the tireless efforts and the persistent work of dedicated individuals who are willing to be co-workers with God. And without this hard work, time itself becomes an ally of the primitive forces of social stagnation. So we must help time and realize that the time is always ripe to do right."

A few minutes later Dr. King shared the parable of the rich man Dives, who went to hell, and the poor, sick man Lazarus, who laid outside Dives' gate hoping for crumbs from his table. Dr. King said Dives didn't go to hell because he was rich, but instead of realizing that his wealth was his opportunity to bridge the gulf between them, Dives walked by Lazarus every day and never really saw him: "He went to hell because he allowed his brother to become invisible ... And this can happen to America, the richest nation in the world."

Calling for the Poor People's Campaign that would soon come to Washington, Dr. King added: "This is America's opportunity to help bridge the gulf between the haves and the have-nots. The question is whether America will do it. There is nothing new about poverty. What is new is that we now have the techniques and the resources to get rid of poverty. The real question is whether we have the will ... Ul-

timately a great nation is a compassionate nation. America has not met its obligations and its responsibilities to the poor. One day we will have to stand before the God of history and we will talk in terms of things we've done. Yes, we will be able to say we built gargantuan bridges to span the seas, we built gigantic buildings to kiss the skies. Yes, we made our submarines to penetrate oceanic depths. We brought into being many other things with our scientific and technological power. It seems that I can hear the God of history saying, 'That was not enough! But I was hungry, and ye fed me not. I was naked, and ye clothed me not. I was devoid of a decent sanitary house to live in, and ye provided no shelter for me. And consequently, you cannot enter the kingdom of greatness. If ye do it unto the least of these, my brethren, ye do it unto me.' That's the question facing America today."

Dr. King did not live to see how our nation would answer the question. On the day he was assassinated he called his mother to tell her the title for his next Sunday sermon: "Why America May Go to Hell." Fifty-five years later, we are still waiting. But the time is still ripe to choose the right answer. This holy season of renewal is also a ripe time for all of us to recommit to being the tireless, persistent, dedicated co-workers with God who will help.—April 7, 2023

"The horror of what happened here must always be remembered," she said. It cannot be denied. It must be taught. History must be learned."

The trip was a great opportunity for me, as well, as I was able to meet privately with President Nana Akufo-Addo to discuss the National Urban League's potential role in promoting inclusive economic empowerment in Ghana.

I also was deeply moved to visit the gravesite and memorial to the great civil rights pioneer W.E.B. Du Bois, who spent his final years in Ghana, and Black Star Square - also known as Independence Square or Liberation Square - built to celebrate Ghana's independence from British colonial rule.

I was inspired and exhilarated by the energy and spirit of the industrious, hardworking, and forward-thinking Ghanian people. African ideas and innovations will shape the future of world, and I am grateful and to have been part of such a historic moment.

- 2. If the City of Hyattsville maintains the current tax rate of \$0.63 per \$100 of assessment, real property tax revenues will increase by 4.9% resulting in \$797,161 of new real property tax revenues.
- 3. In order to fully offset the effect of increasing assessments, the real property tax rate should be reduced to \$0.6007, the constant yield tax rate.
- 4. The City is considering not reducing its real property tax rate enough to fully offset increasing assessments. The City proposes to adopt a real property tax rate of \$0.63 per \$100 of assessment. This tax rate is 4.9% higher than the constant yield tax rate and will generate \$797,161 in additional property tax revenues.

County Council Adopts Legislation Creating Guaranteed Basic Income Pilot Program

Measure to Help Fight Poverty and Increase Equity in Prince George's County

The Prince George's County Council, during session on Tuesday, April 4, 2023, adopted CR-018-2023, legislation proposed by Council Member Krystal Oriadha (District 7), creating a Guaranteed Basic Income Pilot Program tailored to the needs and resources in the County in conjunction with aid from The Greater Washington Community Foundation. The Basic Income Pilot Program will be modeled after the Stockton Economic Empowerment Demonstration (SEED) program in Stockton, California.

Under the measure, low-income families would be given direct cash assistance to support their basic needs, such as food and utilities, without strings attached or repayment requirements. Residents selected to participate in the program will receive monthly cash stipends for 24 months to ensure the financial security of families, reduce debt, and increase financial eq-

Council Member Oriadha says the Guaranteed Basic Income Pilot Program will help address generational poverty, build economic stability, and broaden the scope of public safety services for residents.

"Quite simply, there are vulnerable populations within Prince George's County who will benefit from this type of support, and The People's Council is committed to providing them with resources to ease their economic instability. This is something being done in many jurisdictions around the country, including our neighboring jurisdictions, and I believe it will be beneficial for us in many ways. I also hope that our support of this measure provides a segue for policy change at the federal level."

A committee comprised of Prince George's County Council Members, and representatives from the County's Department of Social Services, the Guaranteed Basic Income Coalition of Prince George's County and the Greater Washington Community Foundation, will create and manage the Guaranteed Basic Income Pilot Program and provide the County Council with annual reports on the program's progress.
