Virtual Meetings Will Share Progress on Light Rail Vehicle Dynamic Testing and Summer Construction

RIVERDALE, Md. (Sept. 12, 2025)—The Maryland Department of Transportation Maryland Transit Administration today announced the upcoming schedule for the Purple Line Community Advisory Team (CAT) meetings. The Purple Line project is now more than 80% complete and these meetings are designed to share construction updates from the summer construction period as well as upcoming construction activities. All meetings will be held virtually between September 29 and October 16 from 6-7:30 p.m. Local residents, businesses and community organizations are encouraged to attend.

"From laying rail to dynamic testing of Light Rail Vehicles, each milestone brings us closer to delivering this critical light rail line," said Senior Project Director Ray Biggs II. "These community advisory meetings give residents, businesses and other stakeholders the opportunity to understand how far the project has advanced."

The Purple Line CAT presenting team includes representa-

tives from the Maryland Transit Administration, project concessionaire Purple Line Transit Partners construction partner Maryland Transit Solutions and system operator Purple Line Transit Operators. Attendees will have an opportunity to ask questions and provide feedback during each meeting. Purple Line virtual CAT meetings are hosted through Microsoft Teams, offering captioning services in multiple languages. James Garnell Turner married Ruth Harper Turner. Garnell was inducted into the United States Army on November 25, 1942. During World War II, he served in Northern France from November 1943 to December 1945. His military awards included the Good Conduct Medal, European African Middle Theatre Ribbon and the World War II Victory Ribbon. On December 15, 1945, Garnell received an honorable discharge from the U.S.

Because of his love for his family and his commitment to God, Dad joined John Wesley Church (later to be named Christ United Methodist Church in 1961). During his years of fellowship, he served faithfully as assistant chairman of the Trustee Board and a member of the Staff Parish Relations Committee.

He retired from the United States Navy Oceanographic Office in December 1977 after 34 years of service. Shortly thereafter, Garnell and Ruth began vacationing annually in Florida, Bermuda, Nassau,

Bahamas, South Carolina, California, Boston, New Jersey, Atlanta, Las Vegas, Pennsylvania. During Dad's many trips, he collected hats. He had a wide collection of hats and wore them well. This was our Daddy's trademark.

Dad was also a master "Craftsman"; God Blessed him with many skills. He could turn a simple design into a beautiful Masterpiece worthy for display. His creativity and artistry were evident in his home, the homes of his children, and at Christ United Methodist Church.

To Be Equal:

Gun Violence Is Eroding Public Safety, Spiking Our Collective Anxiety, and **Threatening Democracy**

I want to start this week's column by validating your anxiety about the state of our country. The violence we see in the morning, noon, and night is not normal.

To date, America has seen 357 mass shootings in 2025 alone; a rate that exceeds one per day.

In the last two weeks alone, we witnessed a mass shooting at a Catholic school in Minneapolis that claimed the lives of two children and injured 21 others, and the violent murder of an influencer. Both incidents have spread like wildfire on social media platforms that have repeatedly failed to curb hate speech and violent rhetoric.

Some users have called for organizing and bringing retribution to their perceived enemies. This content has generated millions of views and likes within days. And rather than quelling anger and anxiety and uniting our nation, political leaders

have taken misinformation and divisive ideals, at times racist, xenophobic, misogynistic, and homophobic, mainstream.

These have resulted in threats of gun violence, bombings, and hate speech that forced historically Black colleges across the country to close their doors for the safety of their students and staff.

One of the most significant risks of allowing this targeted hatred is the dismantling of our Constitution and Democracy.

In the wake of the mass shooting in Minneapolis, outrage quickly shifted from the act of violence itself to the identity of the shooter. This has led to dangerous recommendations to limit Second Amendment rights to one group of Americans, opening the door to legalized discrimination at the federal level.

That combined with the defunding of gun safety programs, background checks, and federal mental health programs, including shudderings of national suicide hotlines, will no doubt lead to more gun violence and public fears.

Let's call these attacks what they are: domestic terrorism.

Students should be able to walk their hallways without being gunned down at any moment. Parents should be able to drop off their children at school, malls, and movie theaters without wondering if it is the last time that they'll see them. Church parishioners should be able to attend houses of worship without the threat of a mass shooter bursting through the doors and taking their lives. People should be able to shop for groceries and leave with food for their dinner table and for their lives.

Gun violence and terror are ripping our communities apart. It's tearing families apart, separating parents from their children. And without the proper leadership and legal measures in place to ensure that these crimes never happen again, our country is being torn apart by misplaced anger, unjustified blame, and extremist rhetoric.

No one should lose their life in a senseless act of violence, and our country should not lose its soul to the damage done in their wake.

Solving this issue is not a game of football where one side wins and the other loses. If we don't get this right, if we don't invest the tools to get to the root of the mentality that causes this violence, and put in the safeguards to ensure this never happens again, we all lose.

Now is the time to demand that our leaders replace platitudes with policy and sow unity, not di-—September 13, 2025

Social Security Matters

I'd like to retire early, but don't want my **Social Security reduced**

Dear Rusty: I will be 65 this year and my husband is 72 (he retired in 2019 at age 66). I would like to retire and enjoy some time with him before he gets too much older. I do not want to have my benefits cut by retiring earlier, but I don't see a way to be able to do that. My benefit will be \$1343 on my full retirement age (FRA). If I took half his retirement when he retired, it would be less than mine. If I take early retirement and he passes away before me, would I get his full benefit as his survivor, or will it be cut? We are trying to figure it out. His current benefit (before Medicare Part B) is \$2978. It's very confusing. Signed: Confused and Wondering

Dear Confused: Whenever any Social Security benefit is claimed earlier than full retirement age (FRA), the monthly amount is permanently reduced. If you were to retire at age 65, your Social Security benefit would be reduced by about 13%—in other words, if your FRA (age 67) amount is \$1343, at 65 you would get about \$1164. And at age 66 you would get about \$1253 per month.

Whether you would be entitled to a "spousal boost" from your husband depends on how your FRA amount compares to 50% of his FRA entitlement. If your FRA amount is less than 50% of his FRA amount, then you would get a "spousal boost," but the amount of that boost would also be reduced if you claim before your FRA. (Note: from the numbers you provided, you may be entitled to a spousal boost and, if so, it would be applied by Social Security when you claim).

Also, FYI, if you take SS before your FRA and are still working, Social Security has an annual earnings test which limits how much you can earn while collecting early benefits. If you earn more than \$23,400 in 2025, you will likely not get all of your monthly SS payments (SS will take away some monthly benefits if you exceed the earnings limit). Of course, if you retire from working, this will not be a problem, because earnings before you claim SS won't count toward the limit.

When you claim your SS retirement benefit now will not affect your survivor benefit from your husband later. If your husband passes first, your benefit as a surviving spouse would be based on the amount your husband was receiving at his death. But if you were to claim your widow's benefit prior to your FRA, your survivor benefit would also be reduced (the amount of reduction depends on how much before your FRA you claim your survivor benefit). If you claim your widow's benefit at or after your FRA, you will get 100% of the amount your husband was receiving at his death (instead of your own smaller amount). It will only be reduced if you claim before your full retirement age.

Are Emergency Services / First Responders Going EV?

Are any police, fire or EMS departments using electric vehicles

Electric vehicles, or EVs, are vehicles run partially or entirely on re-chargeable electric power. The fast-emerging EV market spans a diverse range, including battery electric vehicles, plug-in hybrids, hybrids, fuel cell electric vehicles, and much more. While Tesla dominates the public attention, a wide array of models, such as those from Ford and Hyundai, are being employed in the public

EVs are steadily gaining traction across the U.S., not just with individual buyers, but also through public services sectors such as police, fire and emergency medical services. The adoption of electric vehicles began with smaller testing programs in the early 2010s in cities like Los Angeles and New York City. However, in recent times, the integration of EVs in the public sector has picked up incredible momentum as a result of increasing environmental concerns and improvements in technology. In 2024, the Police Department of South Pasadena City completely replaced its gasoline-powered vehicles with EVs. "This initiative not only ensures the safest vehicles for officers and staff, but also leads to substantial reductions in

at the U.S Department of Energy's National Renewable Energy Laboratory's Center for Integrated Mobility Sciences, referring to a big push towards electrifying major industries.

However, this change comes with its setbacks, such as limited range due to frequent charging halts. This challenge further exacerbates during high-stakes situations such as criminal pursuits or medical emergencies. Next, since EVs are solely reliant on the power grid, they become highly vulnerable during power outages or face battery strains during extreme weather conditions. Lastly, the initial cost of establishing an effective and available charging infrastructure, along with transforming entire fleets, places a significant financial burden on emergency departments.

While the transition towards EVs in the emergency sector is a promising step toward a cleaner future, it is crucial to address the challenges that come with it. Securing loose ends regarding the infrastructure and grid dependency should be combated with a gradual hybrid transition, allowing emergency departments to adapt slowly while proactively mitigating all potential risks.

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
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
