Emergency Food Supplies Hurt by Hurricane Irene

Loss of Power From the Storm Resulted in the Spoilage of Valuable Perishable Food

ANNAPOLIS - The debris is gone and the power has been restored, but many Marylanders are still hurting from the effects of Hurricane Irene.

Residents and aid organizations statewide lost power from the storm, and had valuable perishable food spoil as a result. Now, food banks and state organizations are scrambling to provide food for families who are struggling after the storm.

The Maryland Food Bank felt the wrath of Hurricane Irene when the food storage building lost power on Sunday, and didn't regain it until Wednesday. After the power loss, Food Bank employees rushed to move food from the refrigerators and freezers to refrigerated trucks.

"Our warehouse did as much as they could," said Kate Sam, communications manager for the Maryland Food Bank. "We did everything we could to save as much as

Unfortunately, without a generator to power the freezers, the Food Bank wasn't able to save everything. Food that was supposed to feed Maryland families spoiled. For the next four days, the Food Bank was unable to accept donations.

The Food Bank is trying to obtain a generator so a future power outage can be avoid-

The Maryland Food Bank is responsible for obtaining, storing and distributing food to 600 shelters and soup kitchens throughout Maryland. Problems faced by the Food Bank have a ripple effect on those shelters and soup kitchens.

"We're the safety net beneath the safety net. Without us, other agencies wouldn't be able to serve those in need," Sam said.

Several organizations in Maryland

Swift Water Teams Make Rescues, Provide Assistance

Prince The George's County Fire/Emergency Medical Services Department has responded to hundreds of incident as a result of two days of heavy rains and floods. Preliminary estimates of responses indicate that the Departments Technical Rescue Team, which includes the Swift Water Team, responded on over 60 calls to assist or rescue motorists stranded in stalled water on Wednesday and Thursday. The majority of their responses occurred on Wednesday evening starting at about 10:30 pm and continued throughout the day today. The County opened up the Emergency Operations Center ed by flooded and closed

While operating in Upper Marlboro area this morning the Swift Water Team used inflatable rescue boats to evacuate about 20 people from 11 businesses and 10 homes. The residential evacuations consisted of 12 residents and 2 dogs. Employees and business owners were also assisted out of the area due to flooding. No injuries occurred. O'Malley-Brown Lauds Rules to Keep Health **Insurance Costs Down**

Maryland Will Enforce and Expand Policy in the Affordable Care Act

Annapolis, MD (September, 2011) - Governor Martin O'Malley and Lt. Governor Anthony G. Brown joined Insurance Commissioner Therese Goldsmith in expressing support for new tools available to states today under federal health care reform to help keep insurance premiums more affordable for consumers. The new policies will intensify oversight of proposed rate increases and improve the transparency of the rate

"The rapid rise in health insurance premiums over the last decade has caused increasing hardship for families and small businesses across Maryland," said Governor O'Malley. "We welcome this opportunity made available by the Affordable Care Act to do more to reverse this tide. Marylanders cannot afford to pay 10 percent more every year for the insurance coverage necessary to protect themselves, their children and their

The provisions of the Affordable Care Act going into effect today subject any proposed increase in rates of 10% or more to heightened regulatory scrutiny, and they require plans to explain and justify such increases to consumers. Moreover, in a decision announced last week, Maryland will not limit its increased regulatory review to proposals to raise premium rates by 10%, but will instead expand on a phased-in basis this heightened scrutiny to all plans proposing increases of any size.

In applauding the joint state and federal action, Lt. Governor Brown said, "This enhanced public and regulatory oversight will help hold down large premium hikes and ensure better value for the premium dollar. It's yet another tool made possible by the Affordable Care Act to reduce costs, expand access, and improve the quality of health care in Maryland."

Using federal grant funds, the Maryland Insurance Administration conducted an analysis of how to improve its premium rate review process under the new federal regulatory framework, and it issued its report and recommendations last week.

"Maryland is building on its effective rate review process to do more to ensure that increases in insurance premiums are justified," said Insurance Commissioner Goldsmith. "As consumers weigh their options in choosing benefit plans, they need to know premiums are fair and reasonable.

Hurricane Irene Purges Chesapeake Bay's Dead Zones

WASHINGTON - Hurricane Irene's high winds breathed a little life into the polluted Chesapeake Bay, bringing some short-term relief to wildlife by temporarily eliminating the estuary's vast dead zone, according to the Maryland Department Natural of Resources.

The bay's dead zone -- a stretch of deep water running from Baltimore to Virginia with dissolved oxygen levels too low to support most aquatic life -emerges every summer and naturally fades with the fall. But this year's dead zone diminished earlier than usual after Irene whipped the area, mixing layers of water containing varying levels of oxygen.

The revived waters could provide habitat for marine life in places that were previously not livable, said Jenn Aiosa, Maryland senior scientist for the Chesapeake Bay Foundation.

"It might open up additional habitat that, three weeks ago, wasn't hospitable because the oxygen was low," Aiosa said. "A greater volume of the bay with oxygen is good, primarily for the fish that transit the bay,

Statement on the Employment Situation in August

WASHINGTON- Katherine Abraham, Member of the Council of Economic Advisors, issued the following statement today on the employment situation in August.

The Employment Situation in August, posted by Katharine Abraham on September 02, 2011

Today's employment report shows that private sector payrolls increased by 17,000 and overall payroll employment was flat in August. The unemplovment rate remained unchanged at 9.1 percent, a level that remains unacceptably high. Despite a slowdown in economic growth from substantial headwinds experienced throughout the year, the economy has added private sector jobs for 18 straight months, for a total of 2.4 million jobs over

that period. Clearly, faster growth is needed to replace the jobs lost in the downturn. Today's report underscores the President's call for Congress to pass a clean extension of the transportation bill to keep workers on the job and keep critical highway construction, bridge repair, mass transit and other important projects moving forward. Next week, the President will lay out a series of additional bipartisan steps that Congress can take immediately to put more money in the paychecks of working and middle class families; to make it easier for small businesses to hire workers; to put construction crews to work rebuilding our nation's infrastructure; and other measures that will help the economy grow while still reducing our deficit and getting our fiscal

house in order.

Sectors with employment increases in August included health care and social assistance (+35,500) and professional and business services (+28,000). Sectors with employment declines included information (-48,000, which includes striking Verizon workers), construction (-5,000), and manufacturing (-3,000). Local government lost 20,000 jobs and has shed 398,000 jobs since February 2010. State government added 5.000 jobs as an estimated 22,000 furloughed Minnesota state workers returned to work.

The monthly employment and unemployment numbers are volatile and employment estimates are subject to substantial revision. Therefore, as the Administration always stresses, it is important not to read too much into any one monthly report.

Mikulski Votes to Proceed With America Invention Act

Patent reform legislation is first step toward passing another jobs bill, Mikulski says Reforms would benefit small business applicants and spur innovation

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senator Barbara A. Mikulski (D-Md.) today voted in favor of proceeding with the America Invents Act. The bipartisan legislation would significantly reform America's patent system for the first time in 60 years. This is an important step forward in Senate consideration of the bill.

"This is about jobs, jobs, jobs," Senator Mikulski said. "Right now there are 700,000 patent applications waiting to be reviewed. That's three years worth of American innovation and jobs that are on hold. This patent reform legislation is the first step toward passing another jobs bill. It's a good step, but not the only step. We have many pending bills that will help create and save jobs without creating new bureaucracy, new rules or new regulations. Congress should pass bills like this one, reauthorize the FAA and return to regular order in appropriations. These are all jobs bills."

Currently, there are 700,000 patent applications awaiting review. The America Invents Act would give the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office the tools it needs to work through that backlog and lower fees for small business applicants by up to 75 percent.

Washington, DC – Maryland Congressman Chris Van Hollen, Ranking Member of the House Budget Committee, released the following statement on today's Department of Labor report indicating that the unemployment rate remained at 9.1 percent:

"Today's jobs report is a stark reminder that we need to focus on putting America back to work. Millions of people remain unemployed and too many families are struggling to make ends meet every month. There is no question that we must act on a bipartisan basis to advance our recovery. As part of the strategy to reduce the long-term deficit, the Joint Committee should include a plan to immediately boost job growth and the economy. Getting people back to work is the fastest and most effective way to reduce the deficit in the short term."

Practical Money Skills

Financial planners not just for the wealthy

It's not uncommon to feel overwhelmed by the sheer number of important decisions we need to make concerning retirement accounts, investments, college savings and other complicated financial issues. That's one reason more and more people turn to professional financial advisors to help them navigate an increasingly complex economic world. And it's not just



the wealthy who require these services; many middle-class families are turning to outside financial advice as well.

Some people simply require a one-time, objective opinion about whether their current financial plan will meet their future needs, whether for saving for retirement, buying a home or building a sufficient emergency fund. Others haven't even started a plan and don't know where to begin.

Here are a few suggestions for finding the right financial

When searching for a financial advisor, look for someone well-qualified in their field, whose ethics and professional behavior are above reproach and with whom you can be comfortable discussing intimate financial details. Seek someone who asks probing questions, listens to your needs and concerns, won't try to sell you unneeded products or services, and can explain in plain English the potential risks and rewards of every recommended action.

Ask for referrals from trusted friends, relatives, coworkers and professionals like accountants and lawyers. Find out what factors they used to choose their financial planners and how satisfied they are with the results.

Interview at least three candidates. Most professionals will provide a free or low-cost initial consultation and may ask you to fill out a detailed questionnaire beforehand to help guide the discussion. And be prepared with your own questions, includ-

Work experience - how long practicing, types of clients, areas of specialization, etc.

Qualifications, including education, licenses, credentials and other certifications.

Fee structure – are they paid an hourly rate, a flat fee per task, by commission, or a combination of fees and commis-

Services and products offered – some people believe it's a conflict of interest for advisors to earn commissions for products they recommend, so ask for full disclosure if they aren't

References from current and past clients.

For additional questions to ask, visit the Securities and Exchange Commission (www.sec.gov/investor/brokers.htm) and the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards (www.cfp.net).

Many types of professionals call themselves financial planners, but training and specialization vary widely - some are essentially salespeople. Common designations include: Certified Financial Planner, Certified Financial Consultant, Certified Public Accountant/Personal Financial Specialist and NAPFA-Registered Financial Advisor, but the list goes on.

Most groups that certify financial planners have their own credentialing requirements, regulators and ethical guidelines, but education and experience requirements vary. Good resources for learning more about the different types of financial planners, as well as locating local professionals, include the Financial Planning Association (www.fpanet.org), the National Association of Personal Financial Advisors (www.napfa.org), and the Certified Financial Planner Board of Standards (www.cfp.net).

Before hiring a financial advisor, investigate his or her background and disciplinary history, as well as that of their firm. The CFP Board of Standards provides links to the appropriate agencies

(www.cfp.net/learn/knowledgebase.asp?id=7).

Many considerations come into play when hiring a financial planner, but it's worth the effort. You wouldn't entrust your health to a doctor in whom you don't have complete confidence, and the same should apply to the expert giving advice on handling your hard-earned money.

coverage at 20 Subway and Light Rail stations. By 2014, the MTA will have hundreds more CCTV cameras to cover 37 transit rail stations.

Recently, the Governor announced that total crime in Maryland is at its lowest level since 1975. Thanks in part to the use of CCTV cameras, MTA has seen a 26.4 percent reduction in violent crimes in 2011 compared to 2010. Real-time information observed at the Facility is provided to field officers, including suspect descriptions, direction of travel of specific trains or buses, and station views. For criminal suspects sought by the MTA, images captured by CCTV cameras are put in Be-on-the-Lookout

notices and shared with law enforcement agencies throughout the state. In 2010, the MTA used video images in 26 criminal investigations. Of those cases, 18 were closed with the assistance of CCTV video.

Because fall and winter weather brings higher winds that constantly mix the water column, dead zones disappear during colder months.

Weather will largely determine how long Irene's positive effect on the bay will last, scientists said. Because the hurricane also brought nutrients flooding into the bay, the right conditions could cause the dead zone to

"My prediction is that you'll have a small return of low oxygen conditions over the next few weeks," said Boesch, "but it won't be like the extent or severity that we experienced this

security policy.

Next year is a different story. Scientists will not be able to assess this year's dead zone impact until they review more data, but if the nutrients Irene brought remain in the water, Boesch said they could help create a strong dead zone next year.

"If you have an intense event that brings a lot of nutrients into the bay late in the summer, early in the fall, it could very well give the whole process of oxygen depletion a head start for next year," Boesch said.

But Michael and Aiosa said they do not expect Hurricane Irene will play a major role in shaping next year's dead zone. "It's got to be a pretty dra-

matic storm event to have longterm impacts on the bay," Aiosa said. "I don't think the impacts that we see from this one are (dramatic), or that Irene was that level of storm."

"Usually this time of year we are seeing some of our poorest conditions in terms of oxygen," Aiosa said. "Maybe for a short period of time we've alleviated some of that stress."



Stop Political Lions from Attacking Our Children: Join the Rescue Posse

One of the most-watched videos on YouTube a few years ago showed the struggle of a water buffalo family and herd to save a child. It's called the Battle at Kruger Park. It begins with a buffalo mother, father, and child meandering peacefully ahead of the herd unaware that a pride of six lions is stealthily easing up to attack them. Sensing the danger too late, the water buffalo parents and calf immediately turn and run away. The child cannot keep up. The six swift lions lunge and overpower this slowest and most vulnerable family member, tumbling with him into a river. As the lions attempt to pull the buffalo calf from the water, a crocodile grabs one of the child's legs, eager to share the bounty. The tug of war between the lions and crocodiles over the young buffalo prey seems to last a painful eternity. As the lions win and drag the buffalo child onto land and surround him, ready for the kill, you realize, joyfully, that the child is still alive, but are horrified that he now is going to be devoured.

In the middle of this lifeand-death drama, you suddenly hear and then see movement as a large herd of water buffalo a rescue posse-comes storming in to surround the lions, who do not immediately relinquish the child despite being greatly outnumbered. After a moment of herd uncertainty, one angry buffalo-who I just know was the mother-furiously attacks a lion with her horns and hurls him away. Others in the herd follow her lead and confront another lion, but still are unable to extricate the child. Another attempt succeeds as the child struggles to its feet, and the herd swiftly surrounds and whisks him away. A buffalo remains to chase a remaining lion away. Incredulous that the child was saved, I asked myself: Where is our human posse-our community and citizen posse—as powerful human lions and crocodiles eat our children alive across America today? And what lesson should this thrilling rescue of a water buffalo child provide us about our responsibility to protect and save our endangered children?

Protect the most vulnerable first. Powerful animal—and political—predators go after the weakest and the most vulnerable first and so we see far

too many politicians calling for cuts in safety net programs for children at a time when one in five of them is poor and they are getting poorer. They propose to take away food when children and their families are hungry and homeless and cut early childhood and education investments when millions lack the reading and computing skills they need to survive in our economy. The ultimate test of American democracy, historian Taylor Branch says, "is whether we can protect our voteless, most vulnerable group—children—without whom there is no future." So I hope you will join the human posse to rescue our vulnerable children from political preda-

I believe deeply that our unjust neglect of and failure to invest fully in all of our children is the economic and spiritual Achilles' heel that will topple America's leadership in the world in the twenty-first century. I want to yell, "It's the children, stupid!" It's the children—all children—who are the key to a safer, more economically viable and just nation and world order. And for those of us who seek to heed the prophets and Jesus Christ and who believe children are also the key to God's kingdom, why are we so silent in the face of so much child suffering and

Parents alone cannot protect children: it takes a community and aroused citizens. There are many lurking dangers that threaten children over which parents have too little control like the massive joblessness and foreclosures and misguided tax cuts for the wealthy that have ravished our economy.

I am encouraged though, by

two powerful leaders who get it—that it's the children. Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke says: "No economy can succeed without a highquality workforce, particularly in an age of globalization and technical change. Cost-effective K-12 and post-secondary schooling are crucial to building a better workforce, but are only part of the story. Research increasingly has shown the benefits of early childhood education and efforts to promote the lifelong acquisition of skills for both individuals and the economy as a whole. The payoffs of early childhood programs can be especially high." And Nobel Laureate economist James Heckman in a letter to the National Committee on Fiscal Responsibility and Budget Reform wrote: "...it is a natural reaction to cut spending when faced with a budget deficit. Make no mistake, reducing spending in some areas is necessary and warrant-

Preparing for a Hurricane

If you are under a hurricane watch or warning, here are some basic steps to take to prepare for the storm:

- Learn about your community's emergency plans, warning signals, evacuation routes, and locations of emergency shelters.
- Identify potential home hazards and know how to secure or protect them before the hurricane strikes. Be prepared to turn off electrical power when there is standing water, fallen power lines, or before you evacuate.
- Buy a fire extinguisher and make sure your family knows where to find it and how to use
- Locate and secure your important papers, such as insurance policies, licenses, stocks, etc.
- Post emergency phone numbers at every phone.
- Make plans to ensure your pets' safety.

Emergency Supplies You

You should stock your home with supplies that may be needed during the emergency period. At a minimum, these supplies should include:

Will Need

- Several clean containers for water, large enough for a 3-5 day supply of water (about five gallons for each person).
- A 3-5 day supply of nonperishable food.
- A first aid kit and manual. • A battery-powered radio,
- flashlights, and extra batteries. • Sleeping bags or extra
- blankets. • Water-purifying supplies,
- such as chlorine or iodine tablets or unscented, ordinary household chlorine bleach. Prescription medicines and
- special medical needs.
- Baby food and/or prepared formula, diapers, and other baby supplies.
- Disposable cleaning cloths, such as "baby wipes" for the whole family to use in case bathing facilities are not available.
- Personal hygiene supplies, such as soap, toothpaste, sanitary napkins, etc.
- An emergency kit for your car with food, flares, booster cables, maps, tools, a first aid kit, fire extinguisher, sleeping bags, etc.

Preparing to Evacuate

Expect the need to evacuate and prepare for it. The National Weather Service will issue a hurricane watch when there is a threat to coastal areas of hurricane conditions within 24-36

- Fill your automobile's gas
- Fill your clean water con-
- Review your emergency plans and see if any items are

• Tune in the radio or televi-

- · Listen for disaster sirens and warning signals.
- · Prepare an emergency kit for your car with food booster cables, maps, tools, a first aid kit, fire extinguisher, sleeping bags, etc.
- · Secure any items outside such as bicycles, grills, propane tanks, etc.
- · Cover windows and doors with plywood or boards or place large strips of masking tape or adhesive tape on the windows to reduce the risk of breakage and flying glass
- · Put livestock and family pets in a safe area.
- · Place vehicles under cover, if at all possible.
- · Fill sinks and bathtubs with water as an extra supply for washing.
- · Adjust thermostat on refrigerators and freezers to coolest possible temperature.

If You are Ordered to **Evacuate**

Because of the destructive power should never ignore an evacuation order. If a hurricane

warning is issued for your area or you are directed by authorities to evacuate the area:

• Take only essential items

- · If you have time, turn off the gas, electricity, and water.
- · Disconnect appliances to reduce the likelihood of electrical shock when power is
- Make sure your automobile's emergency kit is ready.
- · Follow the designated evacuation routes—others may be blocked—and expect heavy

If You Are Ordered NOT to Evacuate

The great majority of injuries during a hurricane are cuts caused by flying glass or other debris. To get through the storm in the safest possible

- · Monitor the radio or television for weather if possible.
- Stay indoors until the authorities declare the storm is
- Do not go outside, even if the weather appears to have calmed—the calm "eye" of the storm can pass quickly, leaving you outside when strong winds
- · Stay away from all windows and exterior doors, seek shelter in a bathroom or basement. Bathtubs can provide some shelter if you cover yourself with plywood or other
- · Prepare to your home is damaged, or if you are instructed to do so by emergency per-

AT&T Expands Mobile Broadband Wireless **Capacity in Prince George's County**

Additional Spectrum Expected to Improve Connectivity and Performance

NEW CARROLLTON, MD., September, 2011 — Customers in Prince George's County are to experience expected improved mobile broadband coverage and voice performance as a result of continued investment and innovation by AT&T. The company announced today that it has completed a key initiative in its ongoing efforts to enhance the wireless capacity and performance of its mobile broadband network in Prince George's County inside the Beltway.

"The expansion of wireless network capacity is an incredible benefit for the residents of Prince George's County," said George's County Executive Rushern L. Baker, III. "This is great news for the economic development of the County and for our citizens who depend on their wireless devices for conducting business, gathering information and staying connected with family and friends."

The network enhancement adds new layers of frequency, also known as "carriers," to 80 cell sites throughout Prince George's County to more efficiently manage available spectrum and increase mobile broadband capacity. The expansion helps manage ever-growing demand for mobile broadband services by allocating more network resources for AT&T's mobile broadband network.

echoed the problems and concerns voiced by the Maryland Food Bank.

"There was a considerable increase in need after the hurricane," said Rev. Joseph W. Trigg, Rector of Christ's Church, Port Tobacco Parish in La Plata.

The church operates a food pantry every Friday, and usually serves 70-100 people each week. Although specific numbers weren't available, Trigg said the food bank had significantly more people requesting food on the first day the pantry was open after the storm.

Power outages also spoiled food in homes across the state.

The Maryland Department of Human Services reported that approximately 900 people have applied for additional food stamps to replace food they lost during Hurricane Irene.

Additional food stamps are available immediately for families who lost food from the lack of power. However, not all who applied for food stamps are eligible. Food stamp reimbursements

are only available to people who are currently enrolled in the food stamp program, lost power during Hurricane Irene and had food spoil due to lack of refrigeration. Residents requesting food stamp reimbursement must fill out a form at their local department of

social services, and they must sign an affidavit when they request the amount of food stamps to be reimbursed.

Some local food providers felt the impact of the storm immediately. The Light House shelter in Annapolis serves individuals and families, seven days a week, 24 hours a day. There are rooms for the homeless, food for the hungry, and job training for the unemployed.

Although the homeless shelter is run by staff, the food program is run almost entirely by volunteers. Each day, volunteers provide hundreds of hot meals, bagged lunches and bags of groceries to people in need.

When the hurricane struck, dozens of volunteers who were

scheduled to make or serve food were unable to come into the Light House. The staff stepped into the volunteers' role and made dinner for food shelter using frozen casseroles and other food that had been saved in case of emer-

Pam Siemer, director of development and communications, felt that the shelter was well prepared for the storm and received lots of help from community members.

"We were really grateful for people calling us to see if they could help. People were really concerned about the shelter during the storm," Siemer said. "We were really lucky. We were

Movie Review

"The Debt"

"THE DEBT"

Rated R for some fairly strong violence, a little mild sexuality, a smattering of Fbombs.

1 hr., 44 min.

"Truth is a luxury," says Tom Wilkinson in "The Debt." "Some people have to put other things first -- their country, their family." As far as justifications for lying go, that's a pretty good one, and Wilkinson delivers it with his usual conviction. Some of us might even take his side with regard to the specific issue being discussed. The movie does not, however. Based on a 2007 Israeli film, "The Debt" doesn't permit much wiggle room on matters of right and wrong, but it's an intelligent, well-crafted, and grown-up espionage thriller.

We are introduced to two timelines. In 1966, a trio of Mossad operatives arrive at an Israeli military airport. One of them, a woman, has a bandage on her cheek. In 1997, a journalist is publishing a book about her mother, Rachel Singer (Helen Mirren), who is evidently famous for some reason and whose facial scar tells us who she is. Other tantalizing details are established: Rachel has had a frosty separation from her husband, Stephan Gold (Tom Wilkinson), who presumably was one of the men she worked with in 1966. He's now in a

wheelchair. A third operative, David Peretz (Ciaran Hinds), has been invited to the bookrelease luncheon, but has found a way to avoid it. We can see that a lot has happened in the intervening 30 years, and we want to find out what. We're hooked.

I'll let the film fill you in on the details, since that is what the film does best. Smoothly directed by John Madden ("Shakespeare in Love") from a screenplay by Matthew Vaughn and Jane Goldman (the duo behind "Kick-Ass" and "X-Men: First Class") and Peter Straughan ("The Men Who Stare at Goats"), "The Debt" jumps back and forth in time prudently and effectively, providing new information about 1965-66 that sheds light on the situation in 1997.

In general terms, though: The young Rachel (Jessica Chastain), Stephan (Marton Csokas), and David (Sam Worthington), are Mossad agents on an undercover mission in East Berlin. Rachel and David must pose as a married couple, and all three live together in close quarters. The mission, which involves an OB/GYN named Dr. Bernhardt (Jesper Christensen), requires patience and careful planning, and the mechanics of it are provided in scintillating detail.

In the meantime, Rachel adjusts to working with the passionate, hotheaded Stephan and the enigmatic David. She has a

personal stake in the mission, too (it was inevitable that someone would) and must walk the line between steely Mossad agent and vulnerable human being. Jessica Chastain, already a breakout in "The Tree of Life" and "The Help," conveys Rachel's tension and emotion skillfully, supported by strong performances by Csokas and Worthington. The latter has been criticized (quite rightly) being wooden and inscrutable, but here those traits

are appropriate.

Mirren, Wilkinson, and Hinds have significantly less screen time than their younger counterparts, but they make the most of it like the seasoned professionals they are. Mirren even gets to deploy some of the oldlady-kicks-butt skills that were underused in last year's "RED" -- always a welcome sight. It may not be the deepest or most resonant action-drama of the year, but it's respectable, solidly constructed entertainment.

Students Create Symbolic Toy to Raise Money for Sister School in Haiti

Proceeds to Pay for Education, Books, Food and Clothing

Mount Airy, MD (MMD Newswire) September, 2011 --Like the rest of the world, Thomas Conger was shocked and saddened by the devastating earthquake that killed over 300,000 people in Haiti on January 10. 2010. However, unlike most firstgraders, Thomas decided that

emptying his piggybank was not enough. For the past 18 months, Thomas and a group of students, parents and teachers at Mount Airy Christian Academy in Maryland have been developing a stuffed toy that they hope will provide a long-term and sustainable fundraising source for their fellow students in Haiti.

Three months prior to the earthquake, Thomas and his

schoolmates had been matched with Bethel Christian School, an elementary school in Bassainthe, Haiti, (a small village near Gonaives) through an organization called the International Partnership Ministries. "Our students had already started raising money to buy Bethel School some sports equipment, like jump ropes and balls" said Vicky Webster, Principal of Mount Airy Academy. "When we heard about the earthquake, we realized the students would need the money for food, clothing and shelter instead."

Thomas, however, wanted to do more. "I wanted to bring joy to the people of Haiti. They are really good people and have really good music. Sometimes doing good is just not good enough. We have to do great things for people in need," Thomas explained.

Thomas loved stuffed animals and saw a stuffed toy that his mother had just tested for a client's campaign. He asked his parents if he could do a similar project, and create a stuffed animal to raise money for his sister school in Haiti. After discussing his idea with Principal Webster, his art teacher Jenny Farrell, and some of his fellow students at school the Compassionate Youth for Haiti (CYH) was formedwith the goal of initiating the "Friendly Fins Helping Haiti" campaign. The team was soon immersed in meetings about mission statements, product development, branding, fabric choices, manufacturing options, distribution, pricing, marketing and sales.

Mary Farrell, who was a middle school student, drew the first rendering of the toy. "I sketched a manatee that we named 'Janti' and showed it shepherding a smaller fish," Mary explained. "We wanted the toy to symbolize the love of God that we show when we care for those who are suffering, and that the people we help are comforted by compassion."

Thomas' mother, Diana Conger, noted that "This was an incredible opportunity for these young people to create, manufacture, and distribute a real product, with real-world problems and challenges that every small business faces. It was an invaluable learning experience fueled by their determination to help their fellow students, and we are so excited to finally be ready to launch," she concluded.

The group's goal is to raise enough proceeds from Janti to be able to send another check to Bethel Christian School via International Partnership Ministries and their missionaries, Rev. Lucien and Maude Saul, before January 10, 2012, which is the second anniversary of the earthquake. The students of CYH hope that Janti will prove to be as popular as the focus groups indicated so that sales will continue and the group can continue to send checks every year.

"Students who attend the Bethel Christian School receive an education, books, clothes for school and a meal. For many students, this is their only meal for the day and many students stuff their pockets to take food home to their siblings. One hundred dollars is enough to sponsor one child for the whole year at the school" said Principal Vicky Webster. "We are hoping Janti will help support students in Haiti in the long term as they try to rebuild their lives."

The Edge of Sports

The NFL will remember 9/11 in all the wrong ways

Ten years ago, on the first Sunday after the 9/11 terrorist attacks, the NFL did something truly heroic and generous: nothing. The league willingly ate millions of dollars and cancelled the games out of respect for the unfolding tragedy. As 9/11 morphed into a decade-long "Global War on Terror", the league has, to put it mildly, failed to show similar restraint. From the now ubiquitous presence of military flyovers and honor guards at every game, to the armed forces recruitment stations set up outside preseason contests, to having war-gourmands like General David Petraeus toss the coin before the Super Bowl, to staging Fox's NFL pregame show from Bagram Airfield in Afghanistan (with Terry, Howie and the gang dressed in fatigues), the league has treated our era of endless war as an odious exercise in corporate branding. This Sunday, the NFL season opens in earnest on the tenth anniversary of the September 11th attacks and the league, like John Boehner finding an abandoned pack of unfiltered smokes, just can't control itself. Teams will be going all out to commemorate that horrific day ten years ago when 3000 people were killed in DC, Pennsylvania, and New York City. If you think this anniversary should be remembered with somber soft voices, and about as far away from a football game as possible, you are going to want to keep your distance from NFL Sunday or you will lose your lunch.

NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell, on ESPN's Mike and Mike in the Morning, said without a hint of humility, that the NFL will aim this Sunday to "help the country heal." How will this healing take place? As the Associated Press reported, "Pregame tributes will be synchronized on CBS and Fox telecasts and shown on video boards in each stadium hosting games. Coaches, players and local first responders will hold field-length American flags for the playing of the national anthem." The AP also reported that players, coaches and the sideline rabble will be compelled to wear a specially customized NFL 9/11 ribbon. The official "NFL 9/11 logo" will also be on the field of every game.

Roger Goodell's office says that this pomp is aimed to "unite fans to recognize those who lost their lives, honor the families who lost loved ones, and salute the American spirit, the early responders on 9/11, and other heroes that contributed to the nation's recovery." If you are one of the 25 million Americans looking for work, or related to one of the hundreds of thousands of troops stationed overseas in three theaters of war, you might wonder what recovery Goodell is

The last decade has more resembled a sweat-soaked fever-dream than anything resembling a "recovery." The statistics boggle the mind. More than 6,000 US troops have been killed. Over 550,000 soldiers have put in claims for disability. Among those unfortunate enough to have been born in the countries the US has invaded and occupied, the death toll has been estimated to be as much as one million lives lost. The current number of war refugees and displaced persons reaches almost eight million people. The economic cost to the United States has been estimated by Nobel Prize winning economist Joseph Stiglitz to be as high as five trillion dollars. Now everyone in Washington DC is shocked that a decade of tax cuts and war has led to record deficits, and working people are told to "tighten our belts." It's been an awful decade of lies and loss, and its reality will go unacknowledged this Sunday.

In all the scurrying to make sure "9/11 NFL Sunday" is a day to remember, one name is strikingly absent from the press release trumpeting the day's events: Pat Tillman. After 9/11, Tillman took the extraordinary step of leaving the NFL to join the Army Rangers. His experiences in Iraq and Afghanistan pushed him to question the official rational for the Global War on Terror. He read anti-war authors. He told friends that he felt the war in Iraq was "f-in illegal." Then he died at the hands of his fellow Rangers in an instance of what was deemed "friendly fire." The Pentagon and the Bush administration hid this reality from Pat Tillman's family. The NFL, for their part, inaugurated a USO center at Bagram Airfield in Pat Tillman's name without hinting at the complicated realities of either Tillman's service or his betrayal at the hands of those he trusted. The NFL's failure to highlight Tillman in this Sunday's 9/11 tributes is in some ways a relief but it also reads like an act of cowardice. His story is a polarizing one that Roger Goodell wants to avoid on this day of "unity."

But ten years from 9/11, unity is hardly the watchword of the moment. I spoke with Rory Fanning, the former U.S. Army Ranger, turned anti-war activist, who served with Pat and walked across the country in his memory. I asked Rory what he would like to see the NFL do to commemorate the decade anniversary since that fateful day. He said, "I would ask the NFL for an hour of silence for the 100's of thousands killed after 9/11 in recognition of the criminally disproportionate response to that day." If Roger Goodell must do something that sounds pretty dead-on. It certainly feels more right than the queasy mix of war, sport, and choreographed remembrance that Goodell has planned.

EARTH TALK ... "Improving light bulb energy efficiency"

Dear EarthTalk:

What was the BULB Act pertaining to light bulb energy efficiency that just failed to pass in the House of Representatives?

The Better Use of Light Bulbs (BULB) Act (H.R. 2417) was a failed attempt in July 2011 by some Republicans in the House to repeal a 2007 law mandating increased efficiency for light bulbs sold anywhere in the U.S. Sponsors of the bill cited the 2007 bulb efficiency requirements-whereby light bulbs must be 25 to 30 percent more efficient by 2014 and then as much as 60 percent more efficient by 2020—as a key example of how government overreaches its authority.

"The 2010 elections demonstrated that Americans are fed up with government intrusion," said Representative Joe Barton, the Texas Republican who proposed the repeal. "The federal government has crept so deep into our lives that federal agencies now determine what kind of light bulbs the American people are allowed to purchase." It's ironic that the new standards were put in place by Republican President George W. Bush as part of his Energy Independence and Security Act of 2007, a sweeping update of the country's energy policy. At the time, the bill, including the provisions about light bulb efficiency, enjoyed widespread bipartisan support.

The fact that the BULB Act couldn't muster enough votes in Republican-controlled House to pass by the required two-thirds majority shows that even many conservative law-

makers would rather have the country save money and energy than waste it unnecessarily on inefficient lighting. The repeal effort did garner 233 votes, but the 193 opposed were more than enough to override it given House rules.

Maryland's Steny Hoyer, Democratic Whip in the House, derided the sponsors of the repeal attempt for focusing on the wrong priorities in these dire economic times. "By bringing misguided bills like this one to the floor instead of a comprehensive jobs plan, it is clear that House Republicans are still in the dark." Even the National Electrical

Manufacturers Association and General Electric came out against repealing the increased efficiency standards, given the strides industry has made in recent years to roll with the punches and design more efficient bulbs, fixtures and electricity distribution methods. Analysts wonder if the 2007

efficiency requirements will sound the death knell for incandescent bulbs, which have not changed significantly since first invented by Thomas Edison in 1879. While newer, more efficient styles of bulbs-from compact fluorescents (CFLs) to halogens to light-emitting diodes (LEDs)—may be significantly more expensive than their incandescent counterparts (by as much as a factor of 50!), consumers will likely make up the difference and then some over the long term as energy savings accrue. Department of Energy estimates that the switchover to newer, more efficient bulbs will save American households upwards of \$50 per year by 2015, or some \$6 billion in the aggregate.

New efficiency requirements for light bulbs may sound the death knell for incandescents, which have not changed significantly since Thomas Edison invented them in 1879. Newer, more efficient styles cost more but could save consumers some \$6 billion in annual energy costs by 2015 -- while also eliminating the equivalent of 30 large power plants' electrical output and 14 million cars worth of carbon emissions.

Besides saving money, the new standards will save the amount of electricity generated by more than 30 large power plants, according to the nonprofit Alliance to Save Energy (ASE). As for global warming, the new standards promise to save carbon emissions equaling the removal of 14 million cars off the road.

ed. However, when one has dug themselves into a hole, the solution is not to stop digging as much as to start digging the hand and toe holds that facilitate climbing out. Investing in early childhood education is

that hand and toe hold."

When Dr. King left us in 1968, calling for a Poor People's Campaign, there were 11 million poor children. Today there are 15.5 million poor children and who knows what the new poverty data will show on September 13th. I've no doubt he'd be calling for a poor people's campaign today. I suggest that a loud organized voting citizen posse call on our President and Congressional leaders to begin with a poor children's campaign and commit to protecting rather than cutting children's food, shelter, health, early childhood development, and education they need for a positive future. Dr. King is not coming back. We're it. Let's get going to rescue children from the political lions poised to attack them in the weeks and months ahead.
